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





| | Publications | Statement of Issues and Justification Justification: The Western states have 233 million acres of forested lands, with approximately 66% of these forests being in the public domain while 34% are owned by non-governmental entities (source: National Association of State Foresters, www.stateforesters.org.) These non-governmental stakeholders constitute a primary target for extension educational programs in woodland and forest management and wildlife habitat enhancement, and other natural resource issues. Communities in and closely adjacent to forests are another important consumer of extension forestry information. There is a need across the West to develop coordinated extension forestry efforts on a multi-state basis to achieve both programmatic and administrative efficiency and to help meet the requirements of the Agricultural, Research, Extension and Education Reform Act (AREERA). Currently, the western states extension forestry programs vary widely in scope and depth. Numerous states have only one or very few agents or specialists predominantly dedicated to forestry, with only one state having 20 or more. The Western Coordination Committee (WCC) will coordinate the wide diversity of resources committed to western extension forestry and related renewable natural resources. | | | | |

Exchange experiences and ideas for engagement in landscape scaleapproaches to forest restoration and explore both nascent or more accomplished cases from western states, utilizing pathways by USDA and USDI such as :

• Good Neighbor Authority (which has allows Forest Service to enter into cooperative contracts allowing the States to perform watershed restoration and forest management services on National Forest System (NFS) lands;

• **Regional Conservation Partnership Program** (or RCPP, which promotes coordination between NRCS and its partners to deliver conservation assistance forest owners);

• Joint Chief's Landscape Restoration Partnership ("All Lands, All Hands" approach, where Forest Service and NRCS are working in partnership and have improved the health and resiliency of NE WA forest ecosystems where public and private lands.

• Landscape Scale Restoration Competitive Grant Process - LSR projects cross boundaries to affect any combination of federal, state, tribal, county, municipal, or private lands.
