Positives

- Provided an outlet for scholarship, thinking about it fits in YD and CD; ECYD brought this together; research and theoretical focus has been great - different than others; feel “ahead of our time”, but will take time to get to the intentionality, institutionalization; outlet for like-minded professionals; thinking in a research-base
- Group of people that we have and their caliber - raises our work to meet that level; getting to do the presentations we do helps to raise our level; group has been super inviting and welcoming to new members; impressive outputs of our groups (see Barb’s list); great for our careers - a motivating factor seeing what others are doing...helping on degree progression, helping to get tenure -- having a national outlet for publication
- Collegiality and connections
- Drawn to group based on research and inquiry - curious about the why...bringing together people who are interested in that was exciting/exhilarating

Continuance

Improvement

- Convincing others to jump in -it's okay to take on this work
- Would be great to see institutionalization of SC on an organizational level - case study or something else
- We're ready for another project, toolkit is practice, grant is evidence-based practice...perhaps another special issue
 - CDS - June 30 - role of youth in CD; Look at JOE
- How to move youth off the spectator spot and onto the field
- Move beyond programming to practice
- Continually think about funding
- Intentionally recruiting and welcoming new voices and making sure they are comfortable
- Being mindful of responding to the past year - how might our work be different; what is our intentional work opportunities to re
- Pull the levers in Extension and think bigger - how can we connect across Extension - where can our toolkits be inserted
- Explore new journals and opportunities for collaborative publication
- How do decisions impact the elimination/erosion of social capital; lots of mobility/attrition, without regard to loss of institutional memory, etc.
- Youth are gaining connections, but what if the systems still present barriers
- Need to remember that "experts" here, but how to share with other partners, new Extension Agents, etc -- continuing to connect in some of the same places; some concepts might seem simplistic, but are new to more novice employees and stakeholders
- Recruit someone to work on grants and get them - we have worked without a budget, let's see what more bigger better we would do with a budget!
- Continue to connect work to greater 4-H models and systems
- Intentional invitations with the leading PYD folks as well
- Getting more people involved so we can do all the great things we talk about; bring in new people and help them learn what's going on and how to contribute.
- Can we better connect with e-Extension, working groups, task forces, communities of practice, etc.
- How are things structured and how do we learn from past to move into future
- Connect with group founders/initiators and provide update/reflection
- 15 year reflection on the work - when and where can we gather?!
- Continue to infuse new people into the group -- we get new people interested, need to engage them

 - Use what we've had in the past

- Ready-made tasks/activities that can benefit from new voices
- Recruiting

MATTHEW C CALVERT to Everyone (2:31 PM) Change in discourse to include networking/social capital as a significant goal vs ancillary outcome.

Keith Nathaniel to Everyone (2:31 PM) Social capital is becoming more institutionalized across Cooperative Extension.

Mary Emery to Everyone (2:31 PM) providing resources and sharing new ideas and techniques

Denis Scott to Everyone (2:31 PM) Refocusing purpose, building relationships, providing voice and change

Steven Hennes to Everyone (2:31 PM) Many kinds of benefits rippling and accruing to young people, which is the aim!

Nia Imani Fields to Everyone (2:31 PM) Increased awareness and incorporation of SC language/principles

Barb Baker to Everyone (2:31 PM) Youth see themselves in community; so, take action, have bigger voice.

- Half of us went to goals and half went to results of programming work with youth taking action.
- Refocusing of purpose - I like to see this focus rather than just activities. Relationship building
- How to define it. Building your network. What can I give through relationships that I form - also benefits of gain. Lead with giving first and see what opens to you.
- Imagine what would happen if juvenile justice would approach this way instead of picking up cans.

- I'm thinking about a program to take kids to recycling centers to see how to make a buck from cans.
- Middle class in America as being mediators. The scale of social structure shifts social relationships. There are some policy implications; if we have more social capital are they building or eroding? Do we see communities spiraling down; youth disengaged - what perpetuates that? Comes back to our priorities on how we program.

Jamboard 3; What systems changes are we seeing as a result of these ripples - Everyday ways of thinking and doing? Changes in how community capitals?

- *Participants were asked to add a blue sticky note to the one that stands out as the most impactful*
 - Practical research projects that offer real value to communities
 - increasingly becoming part of organizational culture
 - More shared programming among colleagues from various departments within org. using the shared language of Comm. Cap. in particular Social Capital
 - becoming more engrained in program planning and evaluation
 - Focused efforts by Federal govt entities to understand/apply social capital (DHSS, U.S. Joint Economic Committee)
 - Youth beginning to see how program builds SC. But as mentioned need to help them realize that it has two directions
- Reflections
 - How are we documenting our impact? We have an opportunity for growth... "What you measure is what you see as important"
 - Through EYSC, started paying attention to where the capital and \$\$ is going; not just focused on youth, but thinking about the community
 - Giving, before you realize you can get -- Barb shared an anecdote of a relationship with TSC - many years of relationship before it flipped to TSC coming to 4-H and offering to apply for funds
- Challenge: What should our next steps be based on our mapping process?
 - Intentionally documenting our impact - helps us to plead our case and make connections
 - Practical tools - how to get into the field and tracking who and how our things are being used
 - Get on Shop 4-H as a free-downloadable resource
 - Can we get analytics on the new website - *Jacquie will inquire*
 - Is there a request system set up we can explore - did you find this useful? Did you use it?
 - How can we take steps to institutionalize - look at change models and identifying barriers to greater institutionalization of SC
 - Common measures related to SC?
 - Identify where PKRC correlations exist (ex: entrepreneurial networking at CD)
 - More data in a deeper way, more we can connect and build out and scale up to common PYD elements
 - Identify more places of where this matters to have briefing opportunities...philanthropists, donors/board members at 4-H Council
 - Institutionalization - youth in community work; community in youth work
 - How do we balance one governmental viewpoint of SC
 - Interagency Domestic Policy Committee Child Development & Academic Success group - Deputy Assistant and Cabinet Secretary level (Children 0-24) has been recently named
 - Is there a way that we could get support to test this kind of programming to address juvenile delinquency? (juv justice vs juv injustice)
 - 4-H Tribal Youth National Mentoring Program
<https://ojjdp.ojp.gov/funding/awards/2011-ty-fx-0031> - didn't work, but was an attempt by JD to work with 4-H
 - EYSC Model & 4-H LIFE program - options to look at pulling together something here with a 4-H model

- How can principles and strategies extend to other program areas
