From **Kimberly Graeder**: Iowa State University Extension and Outreach partnered with organizations across four communities to engage over 80 Latino parents and their children in *Abriendo Caminos*, a curriculum to promote healthy lifestyles, and prevent obesity among Latino children. This effort is part of an USDA NIFA integrated research, extension and education project led by the University of Illinois- lead institution.

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach partnered with organizations across eight communities to engage 184 Latino parents and their children in *Juntos*, a family workshop series that brings together middle school youth and their parents to support each other as they enter high school and prepare together for post-secondary education.
